- The Read Between the Dines book club continues to grow. I received positive feedback from a new member, "I'm glad I decided to follow through and join the book club. It's a really nice group of women."
- I started to prepare for the start of the Farm to Library program that will start the first week of June. I will have helped this year from Josias, Michelle and James. It was quite an undertaking last year and I appreciate having additional people involved.
- With Jackie only working a few hours per week, I have been managing the Staples orders. That entails placing the order, checking the order when it arrives and distributing to the departments.

# Information Services Report Submitted by Michelle Brandone May 6, 2025

- We now have digital access to NY and local newspapers (Press and Sun 1985-, Evening Press 1960-1985, Binghamton Press 1927-1960, Binghamton Press and Leader 1905-1927) available on our website both in and outside the library!
- Much of my time this past month has been spent supporting my department in handling
  difficult patron interactions, whether that means taking over the interaction for them, going
  over the interaction later to see if there was anything that could have been done differently
  or (in most cases) validating the fact that when a staff/patron interaction goes badly it often
  has nothing to do with library services or the staff member helping the patron and
  everything to do with challenging personal or systemic circumstances outside of our control.
- I had a great meeting with Sulaiminah Burns, the new Events and Fundraising Coordinator at the American Civic Association and the founder of Support Black Business 607. We are planning on Ms. Burns offering business workshops at the library in the fall and I am planning to go to the American Civic Association seasonally to offer a library workshop and library tour to their students attending ESL and Citizenship classes.
- Collections: I have been able to fulfill patron purchase requests (2-3 per month) that are submitted through our "suggest a purchase" form or from requests made in person at the library. We have spent about a third of our budget to date and are on track to spend down the full amount for 2025. We will be spending a slightly lower amount per month for June-August releases in order to have more funds for the big releases that happen in the fall.


### **Programming Updates**

- Queer Tea Hour (formerly Queer Coffee Hour) was relaunched in April, and Cher and I had 12 attendees at the program we offered on 4/23! We are planning on offering this program monthly, providing a LQBTQIA friendly space for conversation, snacks, games and crafts.
- We had a planning meeting with Youth Services for a BCPL all ages Pride celebration. In addition to that event, we will celebrate Pride in June with book displays, social media posts and crafts a Pride themed Take and Make and a special craft at Queer Tea Hour.

Book displays, book lists, a bingo board of activities that can be returned for a prize and an in-person Tiny Art Workshop that follows the 2025 Summer Reading Program's "Color Our World" theme. - With James' help I finalized the planning and promotion for local poet, writer and community leader, Brenda Cave-James' local history lecture, "Margaret Cave and Company" taking place May 28. This lecture honors Ms. Cave-James grandmother during an era of thriving Black businesses and community in the Susquehanna Street neighborhood.


# Circulation:

This graph shows circulation from February-April in 2022, 2023, 2024, and 2025.




# Circulation stats for the past year:

Circulation is on an upward trend.




# **Hoopla Circulation:**

Hoopla usage declined slightly.




# **Hoopla Circulation by format:**

The most significant decreases were in eBooks and comics.




# Libby Circulation for eBooks, Audiobooks, and Magazines over the last year:


Door count increased again in April.



Website traffic increased in March.




# **Website Pageviews:**

This graph shows total pageviews for the past 12 months.




### **Number of Wireless Sessions:**



# Adult program attendance:






• Thank you to Kathleen for continuing to provide coverage for the Youth Services Department. The Department could not function without this assistance.

- Summer Reading Program planning continues. The SRP flyer has been completed and is now being distributed. Keith created a beautiful coloring poster for our annual coloring poster contest. Thank you, Keith! Registration for the program will begin on June 16.



# Letter from the Director, Josias Bartram:

Dear BCPL Community,

This letter is my annual opportunity to showcase all of the work that the Library does on behalf of the community and to reflect on some of the triumphs and challenges that have defined the previous year. To start with, I'd like to thank Laura Haynes for putting together another beautifully designed and informative annual report. This is the third one that she has produced, each more impressive than the last! I'm also thrilled that we are featuring Kathleen Shores in this report. Kathleen is one of the pillars of our Library and—like every member of our dedicated, creative, and empathetic team—she doesn't get enough credit for how difficult this work can be.

On the topic of difficult work, I'd like to specifically highlight the fact that library work is not always as calm and peaceful as the environment that we strive to create for our patrons, and involves a lot more than reading to children and re-shelving books. Libraries are one of the last remaining public spaces without commercial or political pressure, and as a result we end up catering to many community members who have nowhere else to go. At the same time, we are committed to maintaining a safe space for families and other vulnerable patrons. However, when it is out of balance we risk losing families, dedicated staff, and patrons who just want a quiet place to read. Maintaining this balance is one of my most important responsibilities, and I am grateful for the daily support of Broome County Security. We all deserve a safe and welcoming Library.

Despite closing for a week in October for a complete replacement of our rooftop HVAC units (thank you Broome County Department of Public Works!), our 2024 door count is back up to prepandemic levels. Meanwhile, our circulation of books and other traditional library materials continues to lag behind this trajectory while we are seeing record growth in the use of our eBooks, eAudiobooks and other electronic resources. All of this clearly indicates that we are staying relevant to this community through ongoing innovation and reinvention, most specifically with our high-quality (and always free) programs for all ages.





**Door Count** has continued to increase and we have surpassed pre-pandemic numbers:



# What inspires you, and how have you brought that to BCPL?

What are some of the most common needs or challenges you help patrons address? Some of the most common needs we see are hygiene supplies, food, clothing and socks, housing, mental health care, and healthcare. Some challenges our patrons experience include theft, sanctioning, lack of resources, money, and transportation, and being victims of crime.

# Can you share a favorite example of how peer support has made a difference in a patron's life in 2024?

Pat: My favorite example of who I helped last year was a patron who was living in his truck. I helped him fill out the paperwork for public housing. He was on the list 1 year but he is now in an apartment.


Iris: One of our patrons who has improved over last year is a woman who was living at the YWCA. She spent the first portion of last year struggling with alcohol and trying to improve her situation in court. She ended the year as a Salvation Army bell ringer and now has passed her one year mark at court and is off of probation.

What partnerships or collaborations were helpful in supporting patrons in 2024?

Partnerships that were helpful in 2024 include Family and Children's Services, the UHS Hepatitis C program, Catholic Charities' Supportive Housing, Broome-Tioga Workforce, Addiction Center of Broome County, Nutrition Outreach and Education Program (NOEP), and the Salvation Army.


# Collection Count vs. Circulation
